ADHD and disruptive behaviors are some of the most common childhood mental health concerns seen by primary care providers. Fortunately, there are brief and effective interventions for this patient population that can be implemented in a primary care setting. This session will highlight screening tools used to accurately identify ADHD and/or behavioral concerns and describe evidence-based brief behavioral interventions and pharmacological treatments that can be used to treat these youth. Common questions and concerns raised by parents will be discussed and suggestions will be provided regarding how to best respond. This presentation will end with a description of resources and referral information that can be accessed to provide ongoing support to these patients, including effective partnership with schools.

Allyson Gottsman

Allyson Gottsman is the Director of Community Relations for the Colorado Health Extension System, a collaborative of 20 practice transformation organizations and regional health connectors. With a career rooted in healthcare administration, she began pioneering practice facilitation in the early 1990s, focusing on patient-centered care, education and customer service. She developed facilitation training programs and later expanded to clinical transformation as executive vice president of HealthTeamWorks. Allyson has led major statewide initiatives, including the Robert Wood Johnson-funded Improving Performance in Practice (IPIP) program and the CMS-funded Colorado State Innovation Model (SIM), integrating behavioral health into 340 primary care practices. She also managed the Colorado Practice Transformation Network and the EvidenceNOW Southwest project, working with over 400 primary and specialty care practices. Currently, she leads training for value-based payment facilitators, substance use projects in perinatal care and supports Colorado's state-funded behavioral health integration program,

involving 140 clinic sites.



Andrew Keller, PhD

Andy Keller, PhD, is the President, CEO and Linda Perryman Evans Presidential Chair of the Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute, a Texas-based nonprofit focused on improving mental health care delivery through nonpartisan policy research and advice. A clinical and community psychologist with over 25 years of experience in behavioral health policy, financing and best practices, Andy has worked with federal, state and local systems to implement evidence-based care and develop supportive regulatory and financial frameworks. Before his policy work, he was a managing partner at a national behavioral health consulting firm and led community-based programs with a Medicaid HMO in Colorado.



Anne Penner, MD

Anne Penner, MD, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist and Associate Professor at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, CU Anschutz Medical Campus. Since starting at CU, she has worked clinically on the inpatient consult service at Children's Hospital Colorado and in the outpatient clinic both at the Pediatric Mental Health Institute and the Johnson Depression Center. Clinically, Dr. Penner has been drawn to working with medically complex individuals as well as youth and families struggling with disruptive behaviors disorders. Additionally, she has been passionate about the educational mission in the Department of Psychiatry since joining the faculty in 2015. She enjoys teaching multiple courses and mentoring psychiatry residents and fellows in scholarship projects, ultimately joining the training team as the Associate Program Director and then the Program Director of the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship. Dr. Penner also works with two neuroimaging research labs on the Anschutz campus. She truly appreciates the academic mission - clinical, education and research.



Anneka Quinn, FNP-C

Anneka received a BSc in Anatomy and Cell Biology from McGill University. She worked for an economic justice non-profit before returning to school to obtain her ABSN at Duke University. She worked as an emergency room nurse at Duke University Hospital where she gained experience in treating both adult and pediatric mental health crises. While working as an RN, she returned to Duke to obtain her MSN as a Family Nurse Practitioner and DNP with a focus in adolescent health. After several years of practice as an NP, she went on to pursue additional training as a Pediatric Primary Care Mental Health Specialist. She practices clinically at Pediatrics West, P.C. and also serves as their Behavioral Health Program Coordinator.



Ayelet Talmi, PhD

Ayelet Talmi, PhD, is a Professor and a Licensed Clinical Psychologist in the Departments of Psychiatry and Pediatrics at the University of Colorado School of Medicine and Children's Hospital Colorado. Dr. Talmi is the Director of Integrated Behavioral Health, Director of the Harris Program in Early Childhood Mental Health and the Director of Project CLIMB, an integrated behavioral health services initiative in pediatric primary care settings. Dr. Talmi engages in early childhood and integrated behavioral health systems and workforce capacity building and implementation, direct service, advocacy and policy in Colorado and nationally. Her primary clinical and research interests focus on integrating behavioral health into primary care settings, early childhood mental health, workforce capacity building for health professionals, and service delivery systems for children and families. Dr. Talmi is a Past President of the Colorado Association for Infant Mental Health, a Graduate Fellow of Zero To

Three's Leader's for the 21st Century Fellowship, and currently serves on several committees related to her areas of expertise at the national level.



Beau Carubia, MD

Beau Carubia, MD, is a Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist and Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. He serves as the Associate Medical Director of the Pediatric Mental Health Institute (PMHI), Medical Director for the Consultation Division and Co-Medical Director for the Colorado Springs Division at Children's Hospital Colorado. He is also the Associate Program Director for the Child & Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship. Dr. Carubia oversees psychiatric consultations and crisis services across multiple CHCO campuses and specializes in child mental health law, suicide prevention, psychiatric emergencies and the management of delirium, depression and anxiety in medical settings. He earned his medical degree from the University of Colorado after completing his undergraduate studies at the University of Iowa.



Ben Mullin, PhD

Dr. Mullin is the Vollbracht Family Chair in Stress and Anxiety Disorders and the director of the Colorado OCD and Anxiety Program at Children's Hospital Colorado. He completed his doctorate in clinical psychology at the University of California Berkeley. He has received funding from the National Institute of Mental Health for his research on severe anxiety among adolescents.



Bethany Ashby, PsyD

Bethany Ashby, PsyD, is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry and Ob/Gyn at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Her clinical work focuses on the development and implementation of integrated behavioral health programs in obstetric and pediatric clinics. Dr. Ashby serves as the director of integrated behavioral health services in the Young Mothers and Families' Clinic at CHCO. She also serves as the director of the PROMISE Clinic and director of the Colorado Adolescent Maternity Program; these programs provide integrated obstetric behavioral health services at UCHealth. Dr. Ashby is particularly interested in the implementation and evaluation of trauma-informed care in primary care settings and its impact on access to care for medically underserved populations.



Brian Pitts, MD

Dr. Brian Pitts is a board-certified pediatrician and Adolescent Medicine specialist. He is a faculty member in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Colorado and serves the Aurora community as a primary and specialty care provider with the Adolescent Medical Center at Children's Hospital Colorado. Dr. Pitts has served as a leader in suicide prevention in pediatric primary care at the local, regional and national level. He serves as a researcher and a physician voice on the Partners for Children's Mental Health team.



Bruno Anthony, PhD

Bruno J. Anthony, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist, Professor and Vice-Chair of Psychiatry and Chief of Psychology for the Pediatric Mental Health Institute at Children's Hospital of Colorado as well as Research Director of Partners for Children's Mental Health (PCMH). Dr. Anthony received degrees in Developmental Psychology at Columbia University and Clinical Psychology at the University of Wisconsin and internship at the Yale Child Study Center. Prior to coming to Colorado five years ago, he carried out work at the intramural division of NIMH, the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Maryland and the Departments of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at Georgetown University. He has focused his research and clinical work on developing family-focused and systemic approaches to identify and help youth with behavioral/ developmental challenges and their families within primary care and school settings, including increasing access to quality of health services for minority populations. He has also been a leader in determining key components of peer support and the impact of this growing part of the mental health service

array. At Georgetown, he was Deputy Director of the Center for Child and Human Development, which has been at the forefront of developing systems change strategies for children with disabilities nationally, championing culturally competent services and approaches. His work with PCMH is focused on interventions to promote the prevention of suicide in primary care and school settings. Dr. Anthony has been a lead investigator on many large federal and state grants, has served as a member of federal review panels and has published more than 60 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters.



Cecile Fraley, MD

M. Cecile Fraley, MD, is a founding partner and CEO of the independent medical home practice Pediatric Partners (PPSW) of the Southwest in Durango, CO. She received her undergraduate degree from Stanford University and her medical degree from Case Western Reserve University. She completed her residency at Primary Children's Hospital, University of Utah. Dr. Fraley is the Physician Champion for PPSW's Integrated Behavioral Health Care Team. Dr. Fraley is interested in regional health care and policy. She has served on the Centura Mercy Regional Medical Center, Colorado state American Academy of Pediatrics, Rocky Mountain Health Plan's Community Senior Leaders Strategy and the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing's Medical Services Board Boards.

Clare, a Physician Assistant, began her healthcare career in 2009 in Emergency Medicine, where she developed a passion for both physical and mental health care. She transitioned to inpatient behavioral health in 2012, managing patient care and leading a team of Advanced Practice Providers.
